Andrew GLYN-MILLSfor Barwick



Barwick in Elmet & Scholes Parish Council Report from the Chairman for the Year 2010/11

Ladies and Gentlemen of the Parish and fellow Councillors, I am pleased to present my report for Parish Council activities over the past year.

Once again it has been a very busy year with so many changes and events but we have coped well. It helps when I can rely on a good quality team and also to have stability in the ranks. This was achieved with only one change taking place through the year. John Hayton found the commitment on his time too much, due to extra personal and business commitments, and was unable to carry out Council work to the level he would have liked and therefore, felt he should make way for someone with more time available. John will be greatly missed but has agreed to continue to maintain the Parish Web Site and we thank him for this and also for his three years on the Council. John was replaced through co-option by Neil Beaumont who brings an even younger look to the Council and I feel sure he will add fresh ideas and views to our deliberations and discussions. There is an introduction to Neil on page 3 and we look forward to working with him. Paul Birdsall has sustained a most unfortunate illness and missed a number of meetings but we hear the news of his recovery is good and have extended leave of absence for him meantime. His expertise on financial issues is very helpful and is missed.

This year marks the 4 year cycle for Parish Council elections and regrettably **John Tinker** has decided not to stand for re-election to the Council after more than fifteen years service. Fortunately we will continue to be able to call upon his wise counsel whenever required. A full tribute of John's contribution to the Parish is included elsewhere. This created a vacancy and **Andrew Glyn-Mills** (see page 3) having already expressed an interest in joining the Council completed his nomination papers and filled the position vacated by John with the other 11 Councillors also being returned unopposed.

On the planning front it has been a very eventful year with 47 applications evenly split between our two villages, a further reduction year on year (58-2010, 78-2009, 91-2008). Many of the applications were reasonably straight forward and merely warranted our support whilst others demanded more careful consideration for which we are able to call on the expertise of our dedicated planning committee of Councillors George Hall, Norma Fletcher, Geoff Yapp and Helen Elsworth who applied fairness, skill and consistency in formulating our responses to Leeds City Council. As well as local planning issues, we took a keen interest in two significantly large housing developments in neighbouring Parishes, at Churchfields (Boston Spa) involving 170 units and Grimes Dyke (Whinmoor) for 500 units, resulting in appeals by the developers to The Planning Inspectorate in both cases. Councillor Hall made strong representations at the Grimes Dyke appeal and gave considerable assistance to Boston Spa Parish Council and their advisers. Unfortunately, the Churchfields appeal went in favour of the developer whilst the Grimes Dyke decision is expected at the end of May, Leeds City Council has incurred considerable costs in fighting these issues and we know our Parish Council will be facing some challenging situations in the near future regarding the possibility of house building in both villages whereby our population could quite easily double over the next ten years.

Our Finance and General Purposes Committee is another busy group and is made up of Councillors Paul Birdsall, Gerry McDonough, Norma Fletcher Geoff Yapp, Claire Hassell and in-house auditor David Leeming. Our support of community groups within the Parish has included repairs to the nissen storage hut behind Scholes Village Hall for Scholes Village Players in order to help them continue with their popular productions, internal repairs to Barwick Miners Welfare, improvements to pathways and disabled access at All Saints churchyard, dry rot repairs at Scholes Methodist Hall and a grant to enable Barwick Guides to continue and not forgetting our regular support of the Royal British Legion and Poppy Day. The considerable expenditure incurred in renovating the children's playground at Station Road has proved a very worthwhile project judging by the popularity of the new equipment and it is great to see so many young people enjoying themselves. Plans are now in hand for the refurbishment of the Barwick children's playground.

Whilst the **heritage lighting** is complete in Barwick there are one or two areas in the Belle Vue Estate at Scholes which remain outstanding. The embellishments adorned with summer hanging baskets provide a welcome complement to the many flower beds around both villages and help to make the parish such a pleasant place in which to live. The **Christmas lights** in both villages have again brightened up the festive season and been well received by residents and visitors alike. They certainly gave us all that feeling of "well being" during the atrocious winter weather.

The legalities of the transfer of **Scholes Lodge Farm** into Parish ownership have now been concluded and work will soon commence on the new vehicular access for maintenance as well as fencing along the drainage ditch within the field. The funding for this work has been secured via a s106 green space planning contribution arising from the development of 10 houses on Station Road to be known as "Station Gardens". Grass cutting is an obvious and immediate responsibility and the use of sheep for grazing may well be considered as a practical and cost effective solution. Details of the public meeting on 28 April and consultation have been recently circulated where residents can have their say on how the site is to be used.

Having completed the extension to the Barwick Conservation Area we will now be pressing forward with the establishment of a **Scholes Conservation Area** and we hope to complete this with the assistance of Ward Councillors during the next twelve months.

The **Open Forums** which are held prior to Parish Council Meetings have proved very helpful and give Parishioners the opportunity of voicing various issues of concern including parking and the free flow of traffic particularly in Scholes and at school times, bus services and damage to verges, youth facilities, speeding, crime, demolition of trees and a host of other items.

We continue to work closely with our **Police Team** led by Inspector Marcus Griffiths and thank them for their support and co-operation. We receive a written report for each of our meetings with an officer in attendance on a quarterly basis only in order for them to concentrate more of their time on



Letter from MELVIN BENN, re LEEDS FESTIVAL 2011

Dear Resident.

April 2011

I wanted to write, to give you some information on the planned Leeds Festival at Bramham Park.

TICKETS

A number of reduced price residents' weekend tickets have been made available via Barwick in Elmet and Scholes Parish Council. Details of the scheme and the application process have been advertised on the Parish notice boards, the website and by newsletter.

TRAFFIC - key routes

The traffic plan for Leeds Festival 2010 was considered a success overall and the plan remains the same for 2011.

The dates of the festival this year are the **26th to 28th August** but traffic will start arriving from Wednesday 24th August and will leave on Monday 29th August.

A key route for festival traffic is from the A1 M at Wattle Syke along the new local access road West Woods Road and then left over Tenter Hill bridge and south on Bramham by pass / Paradise Way to Paradise bridge. This route will be used throughout with particularly heavy traffic on Wednesday 24th, Thursday 25th and the morning of Friday 26th August. This traffic will be travelling one way in.

From 9pm Sunday 28th August, this route reverses as festival goers leave along the same route but in the opposite direction. This traffic will be travelling one way out and Monday morning will be another peak period.

One way system on A64 Thursday 25th August

The other key consideration, as per 2010, is that throughout Thursday 25th August, the A64 between the Fox and Grapes public house and the A1 M roundabout will be closed to all traffic travelling eastbound (i.e. from Leeds to York). This is because our second routing for the peak period uses the A1(M) and then the A64 towards Leeds using 2 lanes in a one way system and then turning right into site opposite the Dogs Trust.

The one way system runs from 12.01 am very first thing Thursday morning to no later than 5 am Friday morning.

The A64 westbound ie from York to Leeds remains open throughout.

Bus routes travelling along the A64 eastbound from Seacroft to Bramham Interchange will be diverted on Thursday 25th August. For up to date information, please contact Metro www.wymetro.com or tel 0113 245 7676

Alternative route suggestion -

If you would normally use the A64 eastbound to get to York or the A1 (M), could we suggest you use alternative routes via Aberford to Junction 47 of the M1 on Thursday 25th August.

<u>Kiddal Lane junction with A64 York Road & Potterton Lane</u> junction with Kiddal Lane

As in previous years, Kiddal Lane at the junction with the A64 / York Road and Potterton Lane at the junction with Kiddal Lane will be closed from 8 am Wednesday 24th August to 3.30 pm Monday 29th August

Alternative route suggestion -

If you would normally use the A64 eastbound and Kiddal Lane to get to Barwick in Elmet could we suggest you use alternative routes via Scholes on Thursday 25th August

Aberford Road junction with A64 York Road

We are again proposing a road closure this year of the junction of the Aberford Road with A64 / York Road for Thursday only during the period of the one way system.

Traffic Regulation Orders

In addition to the road closure at Aberford Road and the one way system on the A64 for Thursday mentioned in the paragraphs above, we will also apply to Leeds City Council Highways for the following temporary traffic regulation orders:

- 30mph speed limits and NO "U" TURNS on the following roads:
- Bramham / Thorner Road from the junction with Kirkfield Avenue to Tenter Hill
- West Woods Road from Wattle Syke to Tenter Hill
- o Tenter Hill
- Bramham by pass from Tenter Hill along Paradise Way and Spen Common Lane to the Bramham Interchange
- o A64 York Road from the Bramham Interchange to Thorner Lane.
- . No stopping (clearway) on the following roads:
- West Woods Road from Wattle Syke to Tenter Hill
- Tenter Hill
- o Bramham by pass from Tenter Hill along Paradise Way and Spen Common Lane to the Bramham Interchange
- A64 York Road from the Bramham Interchange to Thorner Lane



Restricted movements

- No left turn out of Yellow Gate towards Thorner
- No right turn onto Bowcliffe Bridge from Paradise Way travelling southbound
- o No right turn out of Red Gates 1, 2, 2A or 3

The traffic regulation orders will be advertised by Leeds City Council according to their normal advertising procedures.

Traffic Management Plan

A full and very detailed Traffic Management Plan including full details of all signage, routings, access and exiting strategies etc has been supplied and approved by all relevant agencies as part of the licensing process. Meetings and consultation about the traffic plan with these agencies are ongoing.

TRESPASS / SECURITY / ENVIRONMENTAL PROBLEMS and UNAUTHORISED CAMPING

The public parts of the festival site (which comprise the main entertainment arena, the campsites and the car parks) are well away from all residential areas. Although there have been no problems with trespass in the past, if someone should trespass on your land, then please call the Police in the first instance. If necessary, our security staff will be available to assist them.

We will again have an on-site supermarket and there will also be various stalls onsite. We will also be running a shuttle bus to the Tesco supermarket at Seacroft. We will advertise all of these facilities onsite and in the advance publicity. While we are not able to prevent people from accessing public highways or keep them onsite, we feel very confident that the above measures will mean we have done much to reduce the need for people to go into local villages. There are a very significant number of stewards and security on and around the site, some of whom can be redeployed offsite if necessary in co-operation with and in support of the Police.

FOOTPATH CLOSURES

We have applied to Leeds City Council to temporarily close the following footpaths:

Footpath numbers 12, 13 and 30 - these run through Bramham Park Estate and we are therefore applying to close them during the period of the build and load out of the infrastructure as well as the festival itself. The closure dates applied for will be 15th August to 2nd September 2011.

Mangrill Lane bridleway number 33 for all users from the junction of Mangrill Lane and footpath 16 to the junction with Thorner Road. The closure dates applied for will be 19th August to 31st August 2011.

Mangrill Lane bridleway for cyclists and equestrians from the junction with the A64 along the full length of the bridleway. The closure dates applied for will be 19th August to 31st August 2011.

TIMES OF OPENING

The festival is open to the public from Thursday 25th August to Monday 29th August 2011 with the main entertainment taking place on Friday 26th August, Saturday 27th August and Sunday 28th August 2011. The main public access into the car parks will

start on Thursday 25th August although a number of ticket holders who have purchased "Early Bird" tickets will be allowed access from 2 pm on Wednesday 24th August in order to reduce the traffic during the Thursday peak period. From past experience, the vast majority of festival goers will have left site and left the area by 3 pm on Monday 29th August 2011.

NOISE AND HOURS OF ENTERTAINMENT

If you have a complaint about noise you should call the noise hotline number to register the complaint. The telephone company cannot guarantee the number at the moment and so we will circulate it to you in early August via a letter to residents on the electoral roll along with any other further new information not contained in this letter. This telephone line will be staffed by Leeds Festival employees during the hours of licensed entertainment and some hours outside of this.

The noise levels are strictly regulated and monitored by our onsite acoustic consultants and Environmental Health at Leeds City Council. This year there is going to be permanent monitoring of noise levels at the junction of Kiddal Lane with the A64 / York Road to cover Barwick in Elmet village during the high risk hours for public nuisance.

The hours of entertainment are:

Thursday 25th August – 7 pm— 3 am Friday 26th August – 12 noon—6 am Saturday 27th August – 12 noon—6 am Sunday 28th August – 12 noon—6 am

Although Leeds City Council has granted us a licence for regulated entertainment until 6 am, the main entertainment will finish at 11 pm and the entertainment between 11 pm and 6 am will be low key i.e. cabaret, comedy, some small DJ systems etc and should therefore not cause any noise issues for you.

In addition there may be some sound checks. These are limited in duration to two hours and limited in scheduling to Thursday 25th, Friday 26th, Saturday 27th or Sunday 28th August 2011 not before 10 am.

And finally I extend thanks to my Council colleagues for their hard work, commitment and loyalty - it has been an honour and pleasure to work with them as Chairman during the past year.



WETHERBY CRIME PROTECTION PANEL

Councillor Claire Hassell has recently joined the Wetherby Crime Protection Panel as representative for Barwick in Elmet and Scholes Parish Council. Although the panel has been in existence for many years the Parish Council has not been represented hitherto.

What does the panel do—you may ask? It is not the place to report crimes – that still needs to be to the police on **0845 6060606** or **0113 285 5374** The panel provides advice and information on protecting residents and their property from crime. Did you know the most likely place to suffer the attentions of a pickpocket is a supermarket? The panel provides "lanyards" so you can fasten your purse to your bag or even your coat so you will not fall victim in such a busy place.

The panel will have a stall in the village on Maypole Day Monday 30th May and will bring a couple of old police cars for the young and young in heart to look at and sit in. Come and talk to them and get some ideas as to how you can improve your own security.

Summer is coming – so please remember to close/lock doors and windows when you are in the garden or another part of the property – it is so easy for the burglar to slip in through an open door or window. Never leave keys, purses and wallets in view and if you are away from home put lamps on a time switch and do not forget to set your alarm if you have one.
