


PLANNING MEETINGS

ALLOTMENT NEWS

The Parish Council recently submitted an application to Leeds City Council to nominate SCHOLES allotments near to Sirrell's Garage under the Community Right to Bid legislation outlined in the Localism Act. It has now been confirmed that Scholes Allotments is placed on the List of Assets of Community Value on the basis that it satisfactorily meets the criteria laid down in the Localism Act 2011. The Right came into force in Sept 2012 and its purpose is to give communities a right to identify a property or land that is believed to be of value and to further their social interests or social well being and gives them a fair chance to make a bid to buy the property or land on the open market if an owner decides to sell-in which case the Parish Council has 6 weeks to decide if it wishes to bid and if so the owner is prevented from disposal for six months. The site at Scholes is run privately and has been part of the village since 1941 when Mrs Betsey Gray (owner Morwick Hall) entered into an agreement with 10 residents. The current owner owns a large expanse of land in Scholes and has entered into an agreement with Scholes Development Co giving an option to purchase the land for development if planning consent was granted. The Development Co has confirmed that they have no long term intention of developing the allotment site.

In the case of Barwick allotments the land is already owned by the Parish Council and is therefore protected. Both Sports grounds and Jack Heaps Field are also in Parish ownership

Wife Claire is heavily involved Neighbourhood Development Plan. Three offspring Amanda in the Army Sandra living in Surrey and Richard working in Sydney Australia.

COMMUNITY GRANTS: 2013-14

The Barwick in Elmet & Scholes **Community Fund** is pleased to announce the grant awards for community projects for the 2013/2014 period. The fund was set up in 2012 by **Festival Republic**, promoters of the Leeds Festival and is administered by local volunteers under the guidance of Melvin Benn, Managing Director of Festival Republic. On behalf of the Community, the Fund Committee wishes to thank Festival Republic for their generosity and support. There were 18 grant applications requesting a total of £34,787 for the available fund of £18,000

Scholes Sheltered Housing Social Club - £600 - contribution for meal out & theatre trip, summer day trip & Christmas dinner.

Royal British Legion—Barwick & Scholes branch - £1,056 - for purchase of branded Gazebo & advertising banners as this year 2014 is the centenary of WW1 and there are substantive plans for fund raising and to increase awareness across local events.

Scholes Community Care - £200 - for a day trip to Tong Garden Centre in Bradford.

Scholes Womens Institute - £750 - celebrating 90 years of the WI in Scholes. Contribution towards transportation, afternoon tea and meal out—total project cost £1,500

Scholes in Bloom - £1,300 - for a new bench and planter which will enrich the lives of all villagers and help to achieve an RHS award for the village next year.

Friends of Scholes Primary School (FOSP) - £2,500 - the School is currently fundraising towards new staging, lighting and PA systems in the hall. This award will fund the installation of the PA element.

Friends of Barwick School (FOBS) - £2,500— the School is fundraising for the creation of an "Agile Learning Space" and substantive fundraising has been demonstrated on their part and as such the award will assist towards the total phase 1 project cost of £18,000

Barwick in Elmet Village Hall - £2,214 - for supply and installation of a fixed Public Address system.

Scholes Cricket Club - £1,000 - towards three elements of ground keeping equipment—scarifier, dense brush and cutter cassettes.

Barwick in Elmet Cricket Club - £1,000 - The Club is investing in new practice facilities particularly for junior members and applied for £2,000 for a bowling machine

Barwick in Elmet Maypole Trust - £3,500 - since 2014 is Maypole Year it was felt that the Trust should be supported with its aim of "maintaining the tradition of the Maypole for the enjoyment of current and future generations". The Trustees demonstrated substantial fund raising efforts since the previous Maypole raising in 2011 to achieve their aims in respect of this long standing tradition of the village.

Barwick in Elmet Brownies - contribution for costs in attending the "Big Brownie Birthday Starquest" in May—total project cost £480

Scholes Playgroup - £250 towards total costs of £600 for purchase of outdoor and sensory / multicultural toys. The committee will also provide guidance on other grant sources for similar equipment.

Barwick in Elmet Tennis Club - £900 towards project costs of £5,587 for washing down and repainting of tennis courts and other renovations being funded from members efforts and club funds.

There were four applicants who had received support in the previous year where it was not possible to make a grant.

NEIGBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT

With the assistance of Mike Dando from "Planning Aid" considerable progress is being made with the preparation of our Development Plan. The most important part of the Plan is our evidence as the Plan will need to be approved firstly by Leeds City Council and secondly by an independent Planning Inspector. We have already accumulated much evidence from residents following questionnaires and drop in sessions but we will need to carry out further work seeking residents comments and views in order to ensure our findings are sound.

A draft of the **VISION, AIMS AND OBJECTIVES** of the Plan and drafts of **PROPOSED POLICIES** are nearing completion and will be circulated to all residents along with a questionnaire in a few months time. Consultation events will be held to give residents the opportunity of discussing the draft documents with our team and to record views expressed. We will also be contacting the various social, sporting and environmental groups in the Parish to ensure we get a wide spectrum of views and opinions.

Our POLICIES will cover the planning issues relative to us locally. We do not need to cover National Policies or those adopted by Leeds City as all developers have to adhere to these already. We will be looking at protecting, enhancing and increasing our greenspace and our heritage. Wildlife too is important via protection of trees & retention of hedges, allotments and gardens. The type and size of new properties and whether we need first time buyer, sheltered, affordable, business accommodation will be covered along with density of development. Then we have infrastructure issues, sewerage and drainage, school places and local highways. Leisure issues include youth facilities, footpaths, bridleways and cycle routes. Employment issues covering agriculture, retail and home working will also be included.

We have a very committed group of residents working on these issues but would welcome any newcomers who feel they might be able to contribute to this important project which will eventually be adopted as a statutory planning document to protect the greenbelt areas that surround our villages and maintain a clear buffer separation from Leeds. *Enquiries please to eclairehassell@live.co.uk*


