Letter from the Chairman

This has been a very busy year starting off with another successful Maypole Raising at the end of May. Well done to the hard working organisation team. This was followed by a successful Scholes Gala in June.

There have been a number of changes to the Councillors with Amanda Munro and Tom Crosfill resigning from the Scholes Ward, Tom to pursue a new career in East Yorkshire, they were replaced with Craig Barker and Phil Maude. Graham Field resigned from Barwick Ward to be replaced with Ian Westmorland who also resigned some months later. Geoff Yapp resigned after 20+ years on the Council. We miss Geoff's knowledge and expertise. Matthew Clover from Potterton has joined the Council and it is great to have Potterton represented. Our thanks go to all who have served as councillors. This year saw the Neighbourhood Development Plan become a Statutory Planning Document. Just in time for the big planning applications, Parlington, Crematorium in Barwick, 300 houses proposed for Scholes, the East Leeds Orbital, the revised Site Allocations and the Core Strategy. The Planning Committee work hard writing responses to these large applications and also to residents' property extension applications.

Our "In Bloom" groups continue to keep both villages beautifully floriferous and would welcome assistance, Monday mornings in Scholes and Wednesday mornings in Barwick. The Scholes Lodge Farm group have made many improvements in the last year, it is looking really great with all the daffodils.

The Parish Council has nearly completed taking over the management of Hall Tower Field. This Ancient Monument was purchased by public subscription for the village and it has been sadly neglected. If you have the opportunity, watch the mound being cut by a remotely controlled machine – fascinating. In due course it will be open for use and if you would like to arrange an event, please speak with the Parish Council as English Heritage do have some restrictions and we can advise. We want this valuable asset used. Barwick in Elmet and Scholes British Legion have a new Standard, dedicated at All Saints on 28 April followed by a parade of many Legion Standards to the War Memorial to lay a wreath. A great event in the 100th anniversary of the end of WW1 and the formation of the British Legion.

The year concludes with the 2nd visit of the Tour de Yorkshire, Women's and Men's races again... but pity it is on a Friday. Possibly the Police Outriders will entertain us again just as they did in 2016.

I would like to wish you all a lovely summer and look forward to updating you further later in the year.



Dog Fouling

The Parish Council has received many complaints recently regarding dog fouling, especially on Jack Heaps field in Barwick. This field has been designated as a dog-free zone because it is actually a play area for children and teenagers, and also the area behind the tennis courts in Scholes, which even has clear signage that dogs are not permitted. PLEASE respect these areas. Dog mess is an eyesore and a health hazard. Dog owners have a legal duty to clean up every time their dog messes in a public place. Registered blind people are not required to clean up after their guide dogs.



Most local councils require dog owners to carry a poop scoop and disposable bag whenever they take their dogs out to a public place. Look out for bins marked as dog bins to dispose of your dog bag. If you cannot find a dog bin, then double wrap the dog bag and place it in a normal litter bin.



If your street is littered with dog mess, you can ask your local council to clean it. Councils now have more power to tackle public dog mess under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005. They can issue dog control orders against individual dog owners and can issue fixed penalty fines. Where there is no local rate, the fixed penalty is £75.

In very serious cases, magistrates can issue a maximum penalty of £1,000. If you see a repeat offender or can give the City Council Dog Wardens a description of the dog and owner, contact:

Parking on the pavement and causing an obstruction is an offence and is punishable by a fixed penalty notice.

New Housing Development Opposed

The Parish Council worked closely with residents to get accurate feedback with regards to the proposed 300 house development on the East side of Scholes. Following consultations and significant feedback, the Parish Council lodged formal objections with LCC to this proposal.

As the Council has not considered the application within the time allowed, the developer has decided to appeal to the Secretary of State on the grounds of

"non-determination"., and the proposal has now gone to appeal, and unless it is withdrawn, it will go to a public enquiry.

Typically it takes around 6 months for a hearing to take place, and in that time there will be an opportunity to see the developer's evidence. At the moment we do not know whether Leeds City Council will oppose or support the appeal.

Rest assured the Parish Council will be providing regular updates and we intend to have a public meeting to discuss the most effective ways to oppose the appeal. All parties... including resident groups, LCC, and individuals who wish to make their views heard are all welcome to contribute to assist the Parish Council in achieving our goal.

59% of all fatalities occur on country roads:

59% of all fatalities occur on country roads so drive carefully & think of horses. Horses and their riders are among the most vulnerable groups of road users. Horses are large powerful animals and can weigh more than half a tonne but they can easily panic and bolt if startled. The consequences to drivers, their car, the horse and its rider can be horrendous. By following some basic advice, drivers and riders can help avoid accidents involving horses on the road.

Motorist Advice:

Look out for riders' signals to slow down or stop, slow down and be ready to stop if necessary.

Watch out for sudden movements, horses can be easily frightened and unpredictable.

Don't sound your horn or rev your engine.


Pass wide and slowly when overtaking; giving the horse plenty of room.

Don't accelerate rapidly once you have passed them.

On roundabouts, horse riders will keep to the left within the roundabout until reaching their exit, when they will signal left. They will normally signal right only when approaching exits they don't intend to use.

Summer gardening tips

Summer - the time for recreation and holidays. But before you leave for your summer holidays, we have a couple of tips on what to do in your midsummer garden.

Cutting strong growing hedges

To make sure hedges grow densely and evenly, they should be cut several times a year. After the main breeding period of birds from March to late July, you can start cutting your hedges again.

Shape your Boxwoods

To preserve the details of boxwood trees or bushes which were cut in shape, you should cut back your boxwoods and evergreens.



Remove dead flowers

Removing wilted flowers is not only done for aesthetic reasons, but also supports the formation of new flowering shoots. The plant can concentrate its power to the fresh flowers. Moreover, the dead flowers will not become a breeding ground for pests or fungi. Some summer shrubs like larkspur, produce flowers a second time in autumn, when they are cut back after the main flowering.



Pruning lavender

When lavender has mostly finished flowering, the shoots should be reduced by approx' one third. The following year, your lavender will be back with a strong bloom.

First aid for sunflowers

If your sunflowers did not come through the latest summer storm, the final chapter has not yet been written. With first aid for sunflowers, you can save even turned down stems. Put the fracture in a splint made of bamboo sticks and fix it with duct tape. This way the water supply is guaranteed.

Sow fresh seeds on vacated patches

In August the gardening year is almost over. Some vegetables, however, can still be sown without any problems at the now-vacated patches. These include Radishes, Lettuce, Rocket, Winter Onions and Spinach.

Divide shrubs

Should the flowering of your shrubs get weaker or should the blossoms get bald inside, it's time to give your summer shrubs a rejuvenating cure by dividing them. August is a good month for dividing spring and summer flowering shrubs. Dig the shrubs out with a spade or a fork and divide the plants into parts. The single parts should be at least as big as a fist. Remove sick and withered root parts as well as bald spots. Planted at suitable locations the shrubs will return in full blossom.
