Message from the Chair Phil Maude

The precept and the Parish Council Budget for next year

The Parish Council resolved at its meeting on 7th February to increase the Parish Precept by 5.1%, which reflects the current level of inflation. This decision was taken reluctantly and follows a number of years where no change has been made.

The precept is the request made by the Parish Council to Leeds City Council for payment to fund the Parish Council. The details of each household payment appear on your Council Tax bill. The decision to increase the amount of funding is part of an overall review of the PC finances. This has also seen an increase in rents for the various Sports Clubs in the Parish which use PC land and Scholes Scouts. Rents for these clubs have not been increased for many years.

The PC is well aware that this increase comes at a difficult time for many residents when energy costs are increasing alongside the cost of living. The precept has not been increased since 2013 and our income has reduced in real terms and there is less money available to spend in the Parish.

At the same time the PC has resolved to become more proactive in spending money in the Parish to improve facilities. The Vision for the Future project will provide a new tennis court, MUGA pitch and exercise area in Scholes which should be complete in May. There are plans to improve the Verity Strip which will improve access to Barwick Cricket Club and Barwick Allotments. There are plans being developed to introduce some exercise facilities on Hall Tower Field. The PC continues to maintain facilities at Scholes Pavilion, Scholes Lodge Field and Jack Heaps field for use by residents. Funding to support the celebrations for the Queens Platinum Jubilee is also being provided.

All this expenditure has depleted our reserves and so an increase in the precept has been felt necessary as a prudential response to enable the PC to maintain this level of service and fund its Clerk for the foreseeable future. Full details of the budget for next year are available on the Parish Council website. **The Parish Boundary;** those of you who have been reading my messages from the Chair will be aware of my previously reported concern about the "extension" of the Parish Boundary to the north west of the parish to the Coal Road. This extension would have included most of the northern quadrant of the East Leeds Extension and in time would have added many more people to the parish.

The PC had been informed by Leeds City Council (LCC) of this boundary extension at the same time as the boundary to Harewood Ward had been extended. Mysteriously no one on the Parish Council could recall receiving any consultation correspondence about the proposal. LCC announced the boundary had been extended and proceeded to levy the parish precept on the new properties on Skelton Lane.

Correspondence with LCC revealed that the Parish boundary had **NOT** been extended and it remains on its original boundaries along the western side of the Parish. LCC have apologised for their error. Whilst this means that a couple of small slivers of land to the west of the new road will remain in the parish, the population of the parish will not expand as previously thought and we will retain our rural characteristics. As a result, the PC will not receive quite as much precept monies, as the properties in Skelton Lane are now omitted. These residents will also not qualify for tickets for Leeds Festival, as they do not live in the parish.

Coming soon Post Office, Scholes Sports Pavilion (near the bowling club). The PC are pleased to inform you that a full-service Post Office will be available at the pavilion on **Thursday 13.00 to 15.00 from 10th March.**

Hello, I am excited about joining the Parish Council. I am looking forward to contributing to the PC's work and would like to offer and dedicate some of my free time, to help to improve the community I have been part of for the last 5 years. I have overall interest in social issues, but mostly in the environment, sustainability, health and wellbeing.

The PC has successfully been awarded grants to be used to enhance Scholes. The PC is delighted that the grants have been awarded and would like to thank the organisations involved for their generosity, and the help and support offered in making the process successful. Thanks to Councillor Graham Slater for pursuing this funding.

A total £86,972 was awarded comprised of awards from; **Emmerdale S106 Fund**, **£6,000 Veolia Environmental Trust**, **£38,000 and FCC Communities Foundation** £42,972 to develop the old tennis courts in Scholes. The work started in February and further information re access will be made available once the work is completed. The new development includes resurfacing, new entrances, a single tennis court and a new MUGA pitch, and fitness equipment which will be suitable for use by wide range of ages.

Leeds City Council provided a grant of £350 to be used to plant four flowering cherry trees and bulbs for the wild flower area on Scholes Lodge field.

Barwick in Elmet and Scholes Community Fund, provided a grant of £350 for bulbs and seeds for Scholes Lodge Field.

Groups in the Parish are reminded that if they wish to apply for grants to support community activities they must complete Grant Application forms, which are available on the PC website.

PC consultation have your say! Where do you stand or sit?

The PC is undertaking a public consultation regarding its policy on benches across the Parish. The key issues which the PC would like your views on include:

- Where should benches be located? What should they look like?
- What material should they be made of metal; wood or recycled plastic?
- Who should pay for them? Should new benches be funded solely by the Parish or from sponsorship/donations made by residents? Should commercial sponsorship be encouraged and allowed?

The PC is clear that benches should not block footpaths. The PC would like to see them near the end of country walks, by bus stops, near village hubs, whenever local conditions allow. Please let the PC have your views.

Messy Business! Please help keep the Parish Clean and Tidy take your rubbish home with you and place dog pooh in the bins provided. Why do people hang dog pooh bags in trees? Please stop this, you live in the villages do your bit, take it home and put in the black bin.

You give responsible dog owners at bad name. The leaflet "*Responsible Dog Ownership*" sets out in detail dog owners' responsibilities, copies can be found on LCC website www.leeds.gov.uk

The Orders include the following:

Dog Fouling: Failure to clear up after a dog is an offence and you will be fined or prosecuted. This Order applies to any land within the area administered by the council which is open to the air and to which the public are entitled or permitted to have access either with or without payment.

Means To Pick Up Dog Faeces: A person in control of a dog must carry an appropriate means to pick up dog faeces such as a poop scoop bag, disposable bag or other suitable container for the disposal of dog faeces.

All dogs must be kept under control at all times to minimise the risk of accidents.
